The participants at our first gathering to look at issues for the Plenary Council 2020 put forward many areas of concern they would like discussed in the broader community. The task of the Parish Pastoral Council is to put together a survey for others to make comment before a second gathering, early February. I am grateful to those who attended and especially for the facilitation of Paul Trezise. We can now move forward to the next stage to highlight our concerns, as the Catholic Church in Australia attempts to listen to the Spirit for a better future.

St. Augustine's PPC will meet this Wednesday, 7:30pm at the presbytery. Whilst the primary purpose will be the survey as mentioned, there will also be a brief report from each member. If any parishioner has an agenda item you would like discussed, please speak with a member of the PPC.

Congratulations to Jan Harvey who has been appointed Deputy Principal of Mount Carmel after acting in the position for this year.

Here is an opportunity to sign a petition for two Australians who told the truth about the Australian spying on the Timorese government in 2004, and who face two years' jail as a result. The espionage was conducted by the Australian government so that Australia would have the advantage in negotiations over the Timor Sea resources.

The spying had nothing to do with "national security" but everything to do with financial gain from one of the poorest nations on earth.

Pay the Ransom

A few years ago, teen hazing rituals were making news.

Reports told how young people humiliated and sometimes physically injured younger teens as a way to initiate them into sports teams or school traditions. One ritual called for football players to hold down, strip, and humiliate younger players. Another encouraged school leaders to throw garbage on younger students. Some "just" called for older teens to surround and intimidate younger students in the corridors and grounds.

Hazing has always saddened and angered me. It frightens or hurts young people. It teaches young people to enjoy humiliating others. It holds up failed leadership as good leadership.

I think failed leadership saddened and angered Jesus too. In this Gospel Jesus sees how James and John are looking for leadership perks that will give them power over others. Was he angry or sad when he told all the Apostles, "It shall not be so among you"? Who knows? But Jesus saw how leaders in his time abused authority and used it to abuse others, especially those who were weak. He was determined to teach his leaders to use authority differently. He used his life as the model to follow.

Jesus' life was a ransom, he says. That means it freed people. And, like Jesus, young people have the ability to free younger teens or to imprison them. Hazing imprisons teens in fear and humiliation. But older teens can free younger teens by befriending them, by defending them, by helping them learn new skills, and by showing them how to sacrifice for others.

Jesus clearly defines Christian leadership and asks you to consider whether you will offer it to teammates, classmates, and younger brothers and sisters. Will your life be a ransom for others?

In what ways could you be a ransom, that is, an offer of

Sir, I am a Corporal! During the American Revolution, a man in civilian clothes rode past a group of soldiers who were busy pulling out a horse carriage stuck in deep mud. Their officer was shouting instructions to them while making no attempt to help. The stranger who witnessed the scene asked the officer why he wasn't helping. With great anger and dignity, the officer replied, "Sir, I am a Corporal!" The stranger dismounted from his horse and proceeded to help the exhausted soldiers himself. When the job was completed, he turned to the corporal and said, "Mr. Corporal, next time you have a job like this, and don't have enough men to do it, inform your commander-in-chief, and I will come and help you again." Too late, the proud Corporal recognized General Washington. Washington understood that those who aspire to greatness or rank first among others must serve the needs of all. America's first president found himself in a situation that invited him to demonstrate servant leadership. Where did Washington learn such leadership skills? I have no doubt he learned them here, in these words of Jesus: "*Whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant.*" The young corporal had these words modeled for him by the man at the top. Jesus' disciples, likewise, receive from their leader a picture of servanthood.

I discovered that Service is Joy: It may sound unbelievable, but it is true that Asia's first Nobel Prize winner in Literature (1913), Rabindranath Tagore, was behind the three great national anthems of three nations, viz. Bangladesh, India and Sri Lanka. He was also the first non-Westerner to win the Nobel Prize in literature. He did so in 1913. He wrote this short poem:

I slept and dreamt that life was Joy;
Then I awoke and realized that life was Service.
And then I went to work - and, lo and behold, I discovered that Service is Joy.

Today's Gospel teaches us that true happiness comes from surrendering ourselves completely in humble service to God through Christ. And all we need is a servant's heart, mind, eyes and touch. So, "How's Your Serve?"

"You must be bloody joking" says St. Peter, red-faced with frustration, slamming his clipboard on the ground.
