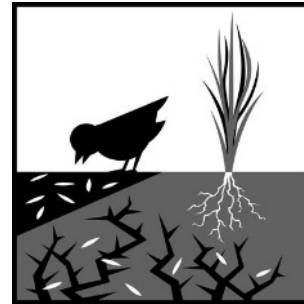
ST AUGUSTINE'S PARISH VISION STATEMENT

The finance committee discussed the possibility of applying for a loan but as the Archbishop instructed me not to embark on any other major projects, we will now use all our reserves to complete this work, beginning next week.

The book entitled 'Shepherd of Shepherds', the story of Fr. Charles Lovat is available at the office, during office hours, reduced to half price at \$10, proceeds going towards the painting of the Lovat Chapel.

Celebrating Sea Sunday

Apostleship of the Sea Australia

This Sunday (12th July) is Sea Sunday, an opportunity to recognise the important work being done by seafarers across the world. The theme for this year is "Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11: 28)

We only have to look around us, in our homes and in our work, to recognise the many commodities that are brought to our shores by cargo ships. In fact, over 95% of global trade is carried by ships. As an island nation, we in Australia are heavily reliant on ships and the commodities they bring to us for our survival.

The Stella Maris (Apostleship of the Sea) ministry has recognised this reality and concerns itself totally with the welfare and pastoral care of seafarers who crew these ships. In almost every country bound by sea, there exists a community of people who care for seafarers, fishers and their families. The Stella Maris Apostolate has, for the past 100 years, responded to seafarers' needs and has advocated on their behalf regardless of their colour or creed.

By anyone's standards, seafarers are burdened more than most other workers. They are in need, especially at this time of the pandemic, of the rest that Jesus promises in this year's Gospel theme. They are burdened by isolation, loneliness, exploitation, wage theft, climatic hardship, abuse (physical, sexual and verbal), fear of piracy and insecure employment.

During this COVID-19 period, all these burdens have been exacerbated leading to extreme stress on seafarers working on cargo and cruise ships globally. Much has been reported in the media about the Ruby Princess cruise ship and the plight of seafarers on that vessel.

Likewise, seafarers are stranded on both cargo and cruise vessels all over the world at this time. Thousands of the

seafarers have already been onboard working for 14 months straight, way beyond the end of their contract due to closed borders and COVID-19 restrictions. We have heard of a frightening increase in suicides onboard ships.

In June, Pope Francis sent a message of support to maritime personnel and seafarers, acknowledging their important contributions to the movement of essential goods during this time of the pandemic.

'Know that you are not alone and that you are not forgotten,' Pope Francis said. 'Your work at sea often keeps you apart from others, but you are close to me in my thoughts and prayers, and in those of your chaplains and the volunteers of Stella Maris.'

These sentiments were echoed by Bishop Bosco Puthur, the Bishop Promoter of Apostleship of the Sea Australia, who has also sent a special message to seafarers in the lead up to Sea Sunday. 'This virus respects no country's borders... I pray that you will receive good guidance and support to keep you safe and well in these uncertain times.'

During this time of the pandemic, Stella Maris chaplains, managers and volunteers have doubled their efforts around the Australian ports to serve these vulnerable confined seafarers when ships dock. In addition to the advocacy work of Stella Maris on behalf of seafarers with the maritime industry, we also seek to support seafarers through the provision of chaplaincy services, care packs of essential hygiene products, phone cards/Wi-Fi, warm clothing, telephone counselling and provision of live stream Masses for Catholic seafarers.

Roslyn Rajasingam, National Director of Apostleship of the Sea Australia, says the seafarers are grateful for the ongoing support of Stella Maris. 'Since the March lockdown, seafarers were not allowed on shore leave so they would contact our centre managers and chaplains if they needed spiritual support or if they needed SIM cards and goods to be bought from supermarkets or computer/digital stores.'

The seafarers were grateful for the care packs our centres provided for them at the height of the pandemic. Their friends and family also contact us on social media to report any problems the seafarers experienced on their ships. They know we are there to support them.'

The Stella Maris ministry is dependent on donations both financial and in kind. The annual Sea Sunday appeal encourages the Catholic community to acknowledge seafarers as the essential workers they are and to respond by giving back something to them in gratitude for all the sacrifices they endure to make our lives more comfortable.

Yuma - my name is Michael Bell youngest son of Ken and Pam Bell, I descend from the Woollabalooa clan of the Ngunnawal Nation, the Woolabalooa are a northern Ngunnawal clan which has its traditional connection to Yarr, the area that is now known as Yass.

I am here today to welcome you to the traditional land of my people the Ngunnawal, on this very special National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday Celebration.

As we the Ngunnawal people have always known, this has been our traditional land for as far back as the spoken word can carry. We also know it will continue to be the traditional land of my people into the future. In acknowledging that we gather on the traditional land of the Ngunnawal, St Augustine's is paying respect to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history of Australia.

Why have a Welcome?

Before colonisation and before the pioneers came to the Yarr Plains, it was the tradition of Aboriginal people that when strangers came into their particular country to hunt or to gather, or to just pass through on their way to other places, that the host Aboriginals' tribe would go out to welcome them. The visitor's presence was made known by the use of fire and a column of smoke, accordingly the reply was returned the same way. When the two groups met, there would be the formalities of the greeting, a smoking ceremony. Part of the ceremony of welcome would be the men sitting around and talking men's business whilst the host women would take the visiting women and children to a women's site to talk women's business. When this was completed, the two groups would join again and a feast and corroboree would take place.

During these ceremonies, the visiting tribe would be taken and shown the sites of significance and be told the stories of the spirit of the land they would be passing.

In this way, the hosts believed that by the end of formalities, when the strangers were ready to move on - they would not be considered strangers but friends who now had the spirit of the country in their hearts—they carried the Ngunna with them—just like the people who lived there. They believed that once the spirit of the land was in their hearts, then those people would never damage the land - they would love it and care for it like those whose home country it was.

With that history lesson in mind I would like to give you all another more recent insight to our history and take you back to the origins of St Augustine's."

Michael then provided a potted history of the establishment of the Catholic Parish of St Augustine's in Yass and made the connection between the welcome he was extending to parishioners in Ngunnawal Country on Sunday 5th July 2020 and the welcome that was given to the Sisters of Mercy upon their arrival in Yass in December 1875. On that occasion, following a speech made by Bishop Lanigan, an Aboriginal elder stepped out of the crowd and welcomed the "Sacred Ladies" on behalf of her Ngunnawal people. Michael also identified the earlier relationships developed between Fr Charles Lovat and the Aboriginal people of Yass as being positive and contributing to a successful Catholic parish in Yass.

Following Michael's wonderful welcome, Fr Mick Burke also spoke of the positive relationship between the Aboriginal people of Yass and the pioneering Catholic priests and nuns. However, Fr Mick further acknowledged that historically there had been areas of tension that had not always been successfully resolved. He identified embracing the theme of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday, "Together in the Spirit" as being the way forward to achieving Reconciliation, healing and an authentic Australian Catholic Church.
