

FEASTS OF THE WEEK

Wed: Our Lady of the Rosary

As I announced last week, my replacement at the end of this year is Fr. Peter My. He has been the Parish Priest of Kambah in the Tuggeranong Valley for the past twelve years and brings experience to the Yass and Gunning parishes. Never taking long service leave for the past 48 years, I will have three months before beginning as Administrator of Braidwood, Bungendore and Gundaroo. During that time I'm intending going to Timor Leste to oversee water projects and the building of offices and workshops for the blind.

This week we received our insurance premiums for the next twelve months and like everything else they have increased significantly. Unlike some parishes, we are able to pay these premiums due to the ongoing generosity of our parishioners. Speaking with Tony Percy this past week, a reduction in pastoral revenue will also impact on the stipend, \$19,000 per annum, of priests. Jopkeeper, no longer available for secretaries, will also mean a tightening of the belt for running costs and maintenance.

Wild Grapes at Harvest

Rejection isn't easy. Everyone remembers the first time they were rejected at school, by the sporting team, or by the boy or girl who wouldn't be our friend. As we get older, rejection can become a serious problem. We have seen or heard account after account of violence and even murder by men who feel rejected by women who do not respond to their advances in the way they would like. However, rejection is inevitable. You will be rejected, one way or another. How we prepare resilience in our children/students to deal with this rejection is an important character-building lesson that we need to teach them.

In Philippians, Paul talks to us about rejection that occurs when we choose to follow the Jesus way. If anyone had a resume and pedigree that would endear him with the most noble of people, the most popular, the most wanted, it certainly was Paul. But if one is serious about following the way of Jesus, we can expect that not everyone will be so accepting of us. When we begin to align our values with those of Christ, rejection might just be inevitable. But for Paul, the goal was not to be accepted by others but to experience the power of resurrection, the power of a lifelived in harmony with God.

What happens when we shift our goals toward that goal? Does our concept of rejection and acceptance change? Do we discover the power of being true to ourselves and to everything that God calls us to be, even though there is a very real possibility that we might experience the rejection of others? This just might be the finest life work of a disciple: to thine own self be true.

Consider 'what you have done, and what you have failed to do'. Which weighs on your conscience more?

"Cease doing evil. Learn to do good" (Isaiah 1: 16 - 17). Turn down one temptation to uncharity every day, and replace it with a conscious choice to be gracious. *"God's kingdom will be taken back from you and handed over to a people who will live out a kingdom life"*.

Creation

Today marks the end of the Season of Creation, a time to remember that we are protectors of this earth and have been given responsibility to care for it, not to plunder and destroy it. The parable told in the Gospel today also speaks to this as we hear that the workers of the vineyard have lost sight of their original agreement with the owner and, consumed by greed, have lost their way.

Today is also the feast of St Francis of Assisi. He experienced all of God's creation as family: *'Brother Sun, Sister Moon, Brother Wind, Sister Water'*. He was a mystic and a pilgrim who saw how intimately connected everything in this world really is. The COVID 19 crisis has reminded all of us of this deep interconnection; what happens in one part of the world affects us all as we share one common humanity and live together on a common home.

During the days of lockdown many of us became more aware of simple things like birdsong, trees, flowers, the earth resting. Pope Francis says that this deeper awareness, *'takes us to the heart of what it is to be human'* and gives us an opportunity to regain a sense of awe and wonder for creation. *'Just as happens when we fall in love with someone, whenever St Francis would gaze at the sun, the moon or the smallest of animals, he burst into song.'* (*Laudato Si'*, 11). The roots of the environmental crisis are deeply spiritual. As we bring this Season of Creation to a close, let it be a spring-board into contemplation and action where our relationship with God's creation is concerned. This is an urgent call. And one which faith communities have a responsibility to respond to. *'Truly much can be done!'* (*Laudato Si'*, 180).

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The rejected cornerstone: There was a legend, well-known in New Testament times, that in the building of God's Temple by Solomon, most of the stones were of the same size and shape. One stone arrived, however, that was different from the others. The builders took one look at it and said, "This will not do," and sent it rolling down into the valley of Kedron below. The years passed and the great Temple was nearing completion, and the builders sent a message to the stonecutters to send the chief cornerstone that the structure might be complete. The cutters replied that they had sent the stone years before. Then someone remembered the stone that was so different from all the rest that it somehow did not seem to belong. They realized that they had thrown away the cornerstone. They hurried into the valley to retrieve it. Finally, from under vines and debris, they recovered it and with great effort rolled it up the hill and put it in place so that the great Temple would be complete. The stone that had been rejected had become the chief cornerstone. Jesus, who had been rejected now reigns at the right hand of the Father.

APOSTOLIC LETTER **SCRIPTURAE SACRAE AFFECTUS** OF THE HOLY FATHER **FRANCIS**

ON THE SIXTEEN HUNDREDTH ANNIVERSARY OF THE DEATH OF SAINT JEROME

Devotion to sacred Scripture, a "living and tender love" for the written word of God: this is the legacy that Saint Jerome bequeathed to the Church by his life and labours. Now, on the sixteen hundredth anniversary of his death, those words taken from the opening prayer of his liturgical Memorial[1] give us an essential insight into this outstanding figure in the Church's history and his immense love for Christ. That "living and tender love" flowed, like a great river feeding countless streams, into his tireless activity as a scholar, translator and exegete. Jerome's profound knowledge of the Scriptures, his zeal for making their teaching known, his skill as an interpreter of texts, his ardent and at times impetuous defence of Christian truth, his asceticism and harsh eremitical discipline, his expertise as a generous and sensitive spiritual guide – all these make him, sixteen centuries after his death, a figure of enduring relevance for us, the Christians of the twenty-first century.
