GOSPEL ACCLAMATION



FEASTS OF THE WEEK

Thu: Saint Teresa of Jesus *Sat:* Saint Ignatius of Antioch

The latest encyclical of Pope Francis entitled "Fratelli Tutti", signed at Assisi on the 4th October, is an urgent call to a world heading towards destruction. The message has been embraced by Christians and Muslims at a time when borders are being closed and the dignity of people is under threat. It calls us to a fraternity where every person is respected and loved.

As you can see, the painting of the Meehan Street wall and the Lovat Chapel is nearing completion. This has been an enormous undertaking and I'm extremely grateful we have a painter who has ensured it will last for many years to come.

Please keep in your prayers the children preparing for their First Holy Communion, to be celebrated at Mass on 21st and 22nd November, the feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.

Archbishop Prowse will visit Yass parish on the 12th November, 10am, a pastoral visit which he is doing in parishes across the archdiocese.

Dining at God's House

This is a strange story: why would invited guests not come to a king's wedding feast? In our time, any celebrity who throws a party can expect everyone to come, the invited along with the uninvited. People want to see and be seen at notable occasions. Certainly, a royal wedding qualifies as a must-see event.

But in this story people do the remarkably inappropriate thi ng: they snub the king. And when the king practically begs them to come a second time, some of those invited do violence to their messengers. This is such an incredible response, we recognise that Jesus is referring to the response to himself and to prophets who came before him. No one would behave this way to a king, his son, and his servants, Jesus is saying. And yet you behave this way to God, God's son, and the prophets.

As listeners to this story, we have a choice. We can be like those invited who don't bother to go, or who retaliate with rage. We can come without preparation. Or we can have something to say for ourselves if caught poorly clad at God's feast. "O God, have mercy on me, a sinner," is a good prayer to have on hand.

A royal wedding

Today's gospel is difficult. Stories of judgement, weeping and gnashing of teeth just do not appeal to most people. We hear about a King whose invitations to his son's wedding banquet are repeatedly refused. In some instances his messengers are killed. One interpretation of this parable is that it is an allegory for the Jesus story, God's invitation to the Messianic banquet has been refused by those who are expected to embrace it. This banquet is therefore opened up to the unexpected, the Gentiles, the poor, those on the margins, the outcast.

Going deeper again, we can hear that God wants to be in a relationship with each of us. We are all invited to this banquet. Yet, sometimes we exclude ourselves from being in fellowship with God. We may be hurt, suffering in a way that is preventing us from accepting the invitation to experience God's love and hospitality. We simply want to be left alone. Notice how the host in this parable persists. God does not give up on us.

And what about that poor chap who did come but was not suitably dressed? If we accept the invitation we should be ready for change and not just change of an outer garment, real change. Because any real experience of God in our lives transforms us in some way or another. Parables were meant to shock those who heard them. The Gospel is meant to make us uncomfortable. Otherwise, what changes for us? We can sit around and listen to nice gentle passages that keep us comforted, or we can be challenged and moved to experiencing something real, something which requires us to show up and be transformed. It is up to us whether or not we accept this invitation.

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Post-World War II: At the end of World War II, the Russian head-of-state gave an elaborate banquet to honor the British Prime Minister Winston Churchill. The Russians arrived in their best formal wear — military dress uniforms — but their honored quest did not. Churchill arrived wearing his famous zipper coveralls that he had worn during the German bomb attack in London. He thought it would provide a nostalgic touch the Russians would appreciate. They did not. They were humiliated and insulted that their prominent guest-ofhonor had not considered their banquet worthy of his best clothes. Wearing the right clothing to a formal dinner honors the host and the occasion; neglecting to wear the right clothing is an insult. Weddings were such an important occasion in Palestine in Christ's days that people were expected to wear the proper clothing to show appreciation and respect for the invitation - clothing, in fact, provided by the host! In today's Gospel, Jesus demands, and provides, the wedding garment of righteousness from his followers.

As the world looks beyond the global pandemic, the Pope's new encyclical Fratelli Tutti offers a roadmap "not just for some, but for everyone", according to Brisbane Archbishop Mark Coleridge.

"Pope Francis has spoken of the need for an open heart that gives birth to an open world, and this at a time when so many hearts and doors and borders are closed," Archbishop Coleridge said, reflecting on the 40,000-word letter that translated means 'Brothers and Sisters All'.

"It is a vision of the dignity of every human being from which flows the call to build a new culture of fraternity and dialogue."

Archbishop Coleridge, president of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, said the Pontiff took inspiration from St Francis of Assisi, starting work on Fratelli Tutti before the outbreak of COVID-19, however its theme became "even more important as we make our way through the weird landscape of the pandemic, wondering what lies beyond it".

Pope Francis wrote early in the encyclical: "It is my desire that, in this our time, by acknowledging the dignity of each human person, we can contribute to the rebirth of a universal aspiration to fraternity."

"Let us dream, then, as a single human family, as fellow travellers sharing the same flesh, as children of the same earth which is our common home, each of us bringing the richness of his or her beliefs and convictions, each of us with his or her own voice, brothers and sisters all," Pope Francis wrote.

"Once this health crisis passes, our worst response would be to plunge even more deeply into feverish consumerism and new forms of egotistic self-preservation.

"God willing, after all this, we will think no longer in terms of them' and 'those', but only 'us'."

Archbishop Coleridge said that in a world riven by conflict and divisions the Pope sets himself to undo all kinds of obstacles.

"The mystical and ecstatic meet and marry the political and economic; politics and charity join hands; walls are knocked down, bridges are built; the rich and powerful listen to the poor and powerless who are allowed to speak first; virtues considered private, like kindness and tenderness, become social and even political virtues," he said.

"... the only realistic way into a future that learns the hard lessons of this time when we have come to see how fragile we are and how much we depend upon each other.

"It's the only practical way beyond dystopia into a more human and civilized world, the only way beyond a gilded barbarism where the social contract is shattered and the brutality of chacun pour soi (to each their own) holds sway."

Archbishop Coleridge noted many of those whom Pope Francis described as often undervalued or treated inequitably – women, older people, unborn children, people who were trafficked, Indigenous peoples, people with disability, migrants and refugees – were similarly those left on the margin or cast aside in Australia.

"In this country we may be tempted to think that the Pope is talking about elsewhere, but he's not. True, he's talking about the whole world – but he's also talking about us," Archbishop Coleridge said.

"Pope Francis offers a grand yet simple vision of human interconnectedness.

"We're all connected to each other in ways we scarcely imagine. Our task now is to work out what this means in practice as we look beyond the pandemic.

"In what he offers in this letter, the Pope can help with that.

"It's impassioned yet tender, visionary yet practical, radical yet reasonable."

COMMUNION REFLECTION

On this mountain the Lord will prepare a banquet for all people.

We are here this day at God's invitation. There is no VIP section, no conditions for being invited, he has prepared his banquet, his Eucharist. for all peoples. The only condition is that we want to be here, that we know our need for God, our need to be nourished by the Bread of Life, to be forgiven by the Word of God, and then we are sent to be this Bread of Life. This bread is baked, blessed, broken, and shared in the name of Jesus. as the bread of life was baked, blessed, broken, and shared by his disciples. Nourish us. Lord Jesus. with the bread that satisfies our hunger for meaning and direction in our lives, our thirst for a companionship that is always faithful, our hope for the fullness of forgiveness, our deep need to know we are truly loved. No conditions for joining in this banquet; come to God as you are, and you will return blessed, refreshed, strengthened and sent forth in his name.


