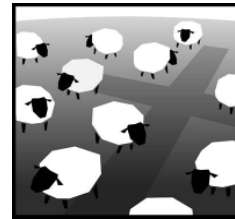

HOMILY

Dividing Walls of Enmity

It has sometimes been claimed that, from space, astronauts can see the Great Wall of China – stretching for thousands of miles and constructed so as to keep the enemies of the Chinese kingdom 'outside'.

We humans love constructing barriers, sometimes to keep others out, sometimes to keep others in – the 'otherness' usually based on race or ethnic or religious identity. In any case, it is to make clear who is 'not one of us', who is to be regarded as 'the other'.

The Jewish people did that at the Temple in Jerusalem.

There was a stone barrier separating the inner area which only Jewish people could enter, and an outer area where 'gentiles' i.e. people from other religious backgrounds i.e. non-Jews – could gather.

In the late 19th century a slab was found bearing the inscription that any non Jew crossing the stone barrier would do so under the pain of death.

It is that barrier which St Paul refers to in the second reading: 'The dividing wall of enmity'. And what St Paul is celebrating is the fact that the 'dividing wall of enmity' between Jew and non-Jew has been torn down.

It is torn down by Jesus Christ in whom a new humanity is being created without discrimination, without segregation, a new People of God.

This new People of God is supposed to be found in the Catholic Church. But what did the Catholic Church often do when it was in a position of political power, or able to influence its exercise?

It collaborated in putting the Jews behind a 'dividing wall of enmity' i.e. created ghettos which disfigured many European cities. These were areas in the cities barricaded off and to which Jewish people were forced to retreat (except, of course, when facilitating commerce for the Christian majority à la 'The Merchant of Venice').

But we can be very proud that it was an Australian, Cardinal Cassidy, who led the difficult early stages of dialogue between the Catholic Church and adherents of the Jewish religion throughout the world. He was given this task by the Pope who adopted St Paul's name as part of his own: Pope John Paul II.

The Pope's mission in this regard was best symbolised during his pilgrimage to the site of the old Temple in Jerusalem in March 2000. You have all seen pictures of the so-called 'Wailing Wall' at which Jewish people pray. It is actually the last remaining great foundation stones of the Temple.

In a little cleft or gap between the stones the Pope pushed a piece of paper on which was written his prayer expressing sorrow for centuries of Christian maltreatment of those whom he called 'the children of Abraham'. I am quite sure that Cardinal Cassidy's hand could be found in the drafting of that prayer.

It is regarded as the greatest gesture of reconciliation between Catholics and Jews and an Australian cardinal helped to facilitate it!

It is true that we are distinctive and have our own identity. Every week we come to Mass in response to Our Lord's invitation in today's gospel: 'Come away and rest awhile.' Our Lord is saying 'Come away by yourselves so that I can nourish you with Heavenly Bread and Spiritual Drink which is my Holy Communion with you.'

We all need a break sometimes. I remember once reading a selection of entries for a Mothers' Day competition, in which people were asked why their mother deserved to win a prize. They all had themes in common - she never does anything for herself; she's always thinking of other people; I can't remember the last time she took a break.

In today's Gospel, the disciples need a break. They have returned from their mission, eager to catch up with Jesus, but there is so much happening that they barely have time to eat. Jesus sees their need, and invites them to take a boat with him to a quiet place and rest for a while. But there is no time for rest, as the crowds have followed them on foot. Jesus is moved by them because they are 'like sheep without a shepherd'. He is the Good Shepherd who always cares for his flock, and he responds with compassion and love.

No doubt the disciples are drafted in to help: it turns out it is not break time! We can imagine their exhaustion. We all feel tired or overwhelmed from time to time, from work or family pressures or simply trying to balance everything. Postponing our own needs to care for others is familiar to every parent or caregiver. We don't know if the disciples got a rest at that point, but we know that Jesus valued time apart as he later sends the disciples off in the boat again while he goes away by himself to pray. In the chaos of life, even when there are demands on our time and energy, it is important to take some time to reflect and to pray.

Be kind to yourself and you'll be kind to others;

and that's how God looks on you.

Dear Parishioners,

With the departure of the Sisters of Mercy from Yass, there is now an opportunity for the Yass Parish to purchase the former residence of the Sisters, at 106 Meehan Street (alongside the Church on the Comur Street side). Father Peter, the Parish Finance Committee and the Pastoral Council have been considering whether such a purchase would be a worthwhile investment for the Parish, and assessing options for financing such a purchase, as outlined below.

One key option being considered by the Parish Finance Committee is to finance the purchase of 106 Meehan Street firstly from the proceeds of the sale of the Parish's existing rental unit in Dutton Street. This would be supplemented by the proceeds of the sale of the Wee Jasper Church late in 2021, following its closure and de-consecration (hopefully) in coming weeks.

At this stage, potential sale and purchase prices have not been finalised and are subject to further appraisal and negotiation. However, the Parish Finance Committee considers it likely that the sale of the Dutton Street unit and the Wee Jasper Church would provide sufficient funds to allow us to purchase 106 Meehan Street outright, including stamp duty, legal fees and agent's commission. It is anticipated that there would also be sufficient funds left over to pay off the Parish's small existing debt of around \$20,000, and to undertake some much needed work on St Augustine's Church, including the installation of a modern heating system at an estimated cost of around \$30,000.

The Parish Finance Committee considers that there are several potential benefits for the Parish if we proceed with this proposal. While we would no longer have the Dutton Street unit, it would be replaced by a larger and more valuable property at 106 Meehan Street. The Meehan Street property would be able to be rented for significantly more than the existing Dutton Street unit, boosting the Parish's rental income. And it would leave the Parish debt free and hopefully with a warmer church! Importantly, it would also give us the option of using 106 Meehan Street as a Presbytery and Parish Centre at some point in future years.

Of course, another option would be to keep the Dutton Street unit and finance the purchase of 106 Meehan Street substantially with borrowed funds. In this case, it is unlikely that the rental income from 106 Meehan Street would fully cover the costs of servicing the debt, leaving the Parish to make up the difference. Although the Parish would have more assets, an additional strain would be placed on the Parish to meet its other day to day financial commitments. In the long term, of course, the Parish could benefit from additional capital gains to the extent that we owned both properties and they increased in value over time.

We would welcome the views of parishioners, ideally over the next week or so, on these important issues.
